ur Stated Clerk, Jeannie Dixon, has graciously agreed to take on more responsibility during the time in which we do not have a part-time, temporary transitional presbyter.

As a point of information, it is not uncommon for the stated clerks of smaller presbyteries to also perform the duties of a general or coordinating presbyter. Our Book of Order requires ("Shall") that each presbytery have a stated clerk, but does not require a presbyter.

The following are Jeannie's additional duties:

"The Stated Clerk shall:

- Provide guidance during the implementation of the newly adopted By-Laws and Manual of Operations of the presbytery.
- Serve as advisor to all ministries of the presbytery.

• Serve as interpreter and facilitator to implement policies and actions of the presbytery.

- Maintain contact with the congregations of the presbytery and help develop a climate of collegiality, openness, trust, love, and understanding among the congregations, ministries, and members of the presbytery as needed/requested.
- Serve as head of staff of the presbytery and its office in the implementation of the presbytery's policies, strategies, and programs
- Communicate the programs, policies, and actions of the synod and the General Assembly to the presbytery."

#### Pastors' terms of call forms fulfill Book of Order mandate

ere's a reminder to all clerks of sessions, treasurers and ministers: Your 2024 terms of call for installed pastors were due in March to the Stated Clerk, so please submit those as soon as you can. Not everyone has submitted the terms of call: there are 22 such positions in our presbytery, and only five forms have been received. The form can be found on the Presbytery's website.

This is a requirement from the Book of Order (G-2.0804 Terms of Call):

"The terms of call shall always meet or exceed any minimum requirement of the presbytery in effect when the call is made. The session shall review annually the minister's terms of call and shall propose for congregational action (G-1.0501) such changes as the session deems appropriate, provided that they meet the presbytery's minimum requirements. The call shall include participation in the benefits plan of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), including both

pension and medical coverage, or any successor plan approved by the General Assembly."

The 2024 Terms of Call form approved by the presbytery's former Committee on Ministry notes at the bottom that the form is to be returned to the Stated Clerk no later than March 1<sup>st</sup> of each year. Even if there is no change from the previous year, the form should be submitted.

#### MPT helps to connect churches and ministers through CLC

he newly-formed Ministry of Pastoral Transitions, assigned some of the functions of the discontinued Committee on Ministry, held its initial meeting on April 2, 2024 under the leadership of Ministry Moderator Rev. Lisa Martin. Much of the focus is on the relatively new Church Leadership Connection process, which is designed to connect churches looking for a minister with ministers looking for churches. CLC utilizes an

algorithm to match forms submitted by churches, describing themselves and their needs, with forms submitted by prospective candidates, thus narrowing the search for both parties.

MPT will also form a panel to assist the ministry by conducting examinations of candidates for membership in the presbytery. The panel will consist of clergy and lay leaders to conduct examination as and when needed.

MPT and the Presbytery welcome Rev. James Holley as supply pastor at Trinity United Presbyterian Church in Tallahassee. Rev. Holley comes to the pastorate after a career in the military and public service employment.


